WASHINGTON, April 6.—At 1:11 o'clock this afternoon President Wilson signed the joint war resolution adopted by Congress and immediately issued the following proclamation:

Whenever there is declared a and any foreign nation or govtrated, attempted or threatened against the territory of the United States by any foreign nation or government, and the President makes public proclamation of the event, all natives, citizens, denizene or subjects of being males of the age of fourteen years and upward, who shall be within the United ralized, shall be liable to be apprehended, restrained, secured and removed as alien enemies.

The President is authorized, in such event, by his proclamation thereof or any public acts, to direct the conduct to be observed, on the part of the United States, toward the aliens who become so liable; the manner and the degree of the restraint to which they shall be subject and in what cases and upon what security their residence shall be permitted, and to provide for the removal of those who, not being permitted to reside within the United States, refuse or neglect to depart therefrom; and to establish any other regulations which are found necessary in the premises
